

The paraments will be blue and the Advent wreath will mark the four Sundays of Advent. At St. John we also hold mid-week Advent services at 1:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. each Wednesday.


Our Wednesday Advent theme is "Together in Advent", a special series to celebrate the family of God together as God's family in sending His Son for our salvation. Each week will focus on a different activity for our "to-do-list" that is centered on giving and sharing instead of on materialism.

<u>Week 1</u> (December 6, 1:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.) "Be Present". Read Malachi 3:1-7. Instead of spending all our time in Advent buying presents, we in God's family set aside space to be present for others as Christ is coming to be present with us.

<u>Week 2</u> (December 13, 1:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.) "Send Peace". Read Micah 5:2-5. Beyond sending cards to loved ones this Advent season, we do all we can as the family of God to send peace to one another because the Prince of Peace is on His way.

<u>Week 3</u> (December 20, 1:00 p.m. only) "Share Joy". Read Zephaniah 3:14-20. In this time when we share cookies and other treats with one another, we share joy with those around us that they might taste and see that the Lord is good to us through the birth of His Son.

FROM PASTOR MATT What Is Advent All About?

Advent is somewhat of a lost season in our culture. It seems as if Christmas preparations, decorations, and advertisements begins right after Thanksgiving, though this year I saw the first Christmas advertisement the day after Halloween. We are pushed from one marketing season and campaign to the next. We move from one big holiday to the next.

This is a problem. Why? Because it never gives us time to slow down and focus on what is coming, to reflect on what has passed and to get our bearings. If we continue from one big moment right into the next we're taking away our chance to reflect and to slow down in our daily lives.

If you asked people today what advent is you might get a blank stare. Perhaps you'd hear something about a countdown to Christmas or about the chocolate in the calendars. But surely there must be more to this season than just that. People don't really know what Advent is all about. This is true in many ways outside the church as it is inside the church.

Even if you've been in church your whole life, you know that Advent is about preparing for the coming of Christ, but you may not understand why the readings we use each week are what they are. We're getting ready for Christmas so why is the first Sunday's reading either the Triumphal entry which we'd expect on Palm Sunday or Jesus speaking of the end times? We just finished the end of the church year where we reflect on the end of days. After the first week the gospel lessons are focused on John the Baptists ministry which makes some sense; "preparing the way for the Christ" was his mission. Yet, the message John has for us is somewhat haunting, "Repent for the kingdom of Heaven has come near." I don't often hear that message in the Christmas carols we are singing; it is in the Advent hymns, but those aren't as well known and cheery.

When we functionally drop the season of Advent we are short changing our experience of God's story and of the gospel story. Advent is the time where we prepare for Christ's first coming and await and anticipate His second coming. >>> This is why we have readings from the Old Testament that anticipate the Messiah, the long-awaited Savior. >>>

It's also why our gospel readings call on us to be prepared for God's return to His people. The word advent literally means "coming". We are anticipating the coming of our King. This anticipation looks back to Christ's first coming and anticipates His second coming. The central prayer of Advent is the one word, the concluding prayer of the bible, *maranatha*, come, Lord Jesus. This is why the theme of the first Sunday of Advent teaches us this season is a time of expectation, hope and waiting, joined with a confidence that we will not be disappointed by God, who is attentive to his people's needs. The second Sunday of advent teaches us the contrast between the things we experience, including the long delay in waiting for God just like Israel waited for their messiah for centuries, and the hope we nonetheless maintain. The third Sunday of advent teaches and sounds the note of anticipatory Joy: Rejoice for the messianic age is here-- God has come.

Advent isn't simply an early extension of Christmas and the joy of Jesus' birth. The theme of advent is the anticipation of the answer that will ultimately be given to our continued prayers; God will come and redeem His people. The visions of the prophets will be fulfilled, which will prove that they have been faithful in declaring God's Word. The Spirit of the season is confidence brimming with expectation and hope, while we wait in uncertainty about the time and places when all these promises will finally see their fulfillment in Christ's second coming (as it says, no one but the Father knows the hour - Matthew 24:36). Advent is preparation for Jesus's return and begs the question, "is your heart ready?"



However, caring ministry is one area of ministry that pastors can delegate to or share with laypeople who have the right gifts, training, and commitment. Pastors who let Stephen Ministers help shoulder the caregiving load find they have more time to spend on the key duties or specific caregiving situations that only pastors are uniquely equipped or called to perform.

4. Multiplies Ministry

Pastors can only be in one place at a time, but they can multiply their reach through a team of well-trained and organized lay caregivers. The pastor at one smaller congregation with Stephen Ministry kept careful records and reported that for every hour of time he invested in Stephen Ministry, seven hours of caregiving resulted. He considered his involvement in Stephen Ministry to be one of the best and most highly leveraged uses of his time.

5. Reassurance That People Are Receiving Quality Care

Pastors know of many more people with needs for care than they can minister to by themselves. Sometimes pastors feel guilty that they aren't providing more care, or they burn themselves out trying to meet the overwhelming needs. Stephen Ministry provides pastors the reassurance that people who need care are receiving it. As one Stephen Series pastor put it, "Since we began Stephen Ministry 15 years ago, I sleep better at night. Right now, for example, I know there are 23 people receiving care—very highquality care—on a weekly basis from our Stephen Ministers. As a pastor, I simply don't have another 23 hours a week to provide that care myself. So it's a joy and comfort to know that people in need are receiving that care from our Stephen Ministers."

STEPHEN MINISTRY

How Stephen Ministry Benefits Pastors

1. Shared Ministry

Pastors no longer bear alone the responsibility for providing care to the entire congregation. They have a team of caregivers—well organized, well trained, highly motivated and committed, and well

supervised-to assist with providing pastoral care. One pastor said, "For the first time in 37 years I am surrounded by a team of people who are as committed to pastoral care of the congregation as I am."

2. High-Quality Lay Leadership

Pastors can rely on well-trained laypeople to carry out many of the day-today operations of Stephen Ministry. The Leader's Training Course (LTC) equips laypeople to function at a very high level of leadership (as Stephen Leaders) so the main workload for this ministry doesn't end up on the pastor's shoulders. Lay Stephen Leaders do a high-quality job because they are well trained, have extensive resources (in their Leader's Manual), receive ongoing support (from the consultation staff at Stephen Ministries and a special section of our website), and are highly motivated, knowing they can make a significant contribution to their church's ministry.

3. Frees the Pastor to Focus on What Only the Pastor Can Do

Stephen Ministers will never replace the ordained clergy because there are certain tasks, duties, and responsibilities that an ordained clergyperson is uniquely trained, qualified, and called to perform. >>>
