

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## APPLICATIONS FOR ENDOWMENT FUNDS

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Applications for Endowment Funds are being accepted until December 5 by the Endowment Committee from any Board or Committee seeking funds. Applications are available in the office.

We also asked those who has received care to share what they perceived others' difficulties were in relating to them. Both caregiver and care receiver respondents shared freely and fully. Here is what they reported, in order of frequency, as major challenges.

1. Knowing what to say to a hurting person
2. Understanding, empathizing with, or validating someone's struggles
3. Talking too much, listening too little
4. Having a "fix-it" mentality
5. Feeling discomfort in the face of someone's pain
6. Focusing on self rather than the hurting person
7. Wanting people to "get over it"
8. Avoiding painful subjects
9. Avoiding hurting person
10. Giving advice, being too direct
11. Minimizing the significance of the pain or suffering
12. Being judgmental
13. Wanting to hear only the positive
14. Responding with clichés, platitudes, or pat phrases
15. Identifying too closely with the other's pain
16. Feeling helpless
17. Handling the anger of those who are suffering
18. Knowing what would be intrusive or welcomed
19. Getting people to open up

This is a formidable list, certainly, but not an insurmountable one. These items on this list are interrelated, which is good news, because as you overcome one area to challenge, it will positively affect other areas as well. Mastering these challenges and turning them into opportunities to relate well to suffering people is what the book, *"Don't Sing Songs to A Heavy Heart"* by Kenneth C. Haugk, Ph. D. and founder of Stephen Ministries addressed in his book.

Stephen Ministers are required to read this book during the training. The 50 hours of training has equipped our Stephen Ministers to help people that are suffering and are discouraged. Those who are suffering are very vulnerable. It's as though they have been stamped FRAGILE, HANDLE WITH CARE. Because suffering people are so fragile, those who relate to them are called upon to function with the greatest sensitivity and compassion they can muster. This is where the challenge lies.

And the challenge of relating becomes many challenges. Identifying exactly what those challenges are was one of the first tasks of our research. We asked caregivers to tell what they thought were their greatest difficulties in relating to those who are suffering.
