From the Desk of Pastor Mews



PASTOR MEWS EPISTLE: OCTOBER, 2025 “THE CHRISTIAN’S ROLE IN SOCIETY”

Since 2017, 500 years after the nailing of the 95 Theses, my Reformation sermons each year have reflected upon the events that specifically occurred 500 years after the actual Reformation in Europe. This year, my sermon and this article will reflect upon Luther’s “Admonition to Peace”, written in 1525.

Since the assassination of Charlie Kirk, there has been much discussion and discourse about the Christian’s role in society and how society functions when there are massive disagreements. There were similar issues in Luther’s day. Peasants believed that they had been abused and mistreated by the wealthy and powerful, namely those in authority, and their response was violence and physical destruction, which greatly disturbed the upper classes. Luther’s popularity, sharp insights and timely Biblical wisdom elevated his thoughts not only for the Church, but for public life. Luther found himself in the proverbial hot spot, “between a rock and a hard place”. He would unleash the power of God’s Word in addressing both sides with the power of the Gospel and the peace of Christ through his tract “An Admonition to Peace”.

1) Luther first admonished the rich as living a life of “luxury and extravagance”, so that the “poor people can bear it no longer”. As violence spread to them, Luther cautioned the wealthy who could bring more arms and force to violence, to “try kindness first and look to God and ask to avoid a fire that no one can extinguish”.

2) Luther urged the peasants to follow Christ’s and the apostles’ teachings and to seek justice through peaceful means. Luther, citing Matthew, asked all to “walk another mile, give them your cloak and coat and turn the other cheek, when one is forcing you who does evil”. (Matthew 5:39-41) Luther believed that Christians are to obey laws that may be unjust, and that Christians are to pray “deliver us from evil”, and to love our enemies.



3) Luther quotes several passages to encourage tolerance of mistreatment. He reminded both sides, the wealthy and the abused, that “the wrath belongs to God. Bless those who insult you, pray for your enemies and do good to those who do evil”. Luther showed concrete examples of Christ and His disciples responding to mistreatment without violence as they turned to prayer.

4) Luther, unlike the violent preacher Thomas Muntzer, who urged peasants into battle, sought to work with governors and his evangelical colleagues to build trust and implement Godly changes for a “whole territory at once”.

5) To Luther, the key was the “changing of the heart”. He supported peasants who believed they should be able to call their own pastors without interference from the State. Luther urged the State to give approval for the preaching of the Gospel, allowing individuals to believe what they wanted. He stressed that the government should bear the Sword to keep peaceful order and to enact policy insofar as it was just.

6) Luther’s thoughts have blessed the world, including you and me, in his desire to keep the State out of Church dogma and clergy selection, yet protecting the freedom of the Church. These keen insights and directives have been proven trustworthy, so much that they have been used by our founding fathers in framing our nation’s first Bill of Rights.

The Gospel of Christ, His death, His grace, and His life provide a Godly path for dealing with difficult and sensitive subjects then, now, and until His return, when we will live in peace forever! In Christ’s service, Pastor K F Mews





The St. John Lutheran Food Pantry is open on Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. If you meet the Federal Income Guidelines, then you can visit our food pantry once a month. With each visit you need to bring an ID with your current address. If you do not have an updated ID, then bring in a current bill with your address.

Since January 1, 2025 we have served 672 families or 1,942 people with a distribution of 3,036 bags of food.

As of September 14, 2025 we have served 47 families and distributed 211 bags of food. We had an average of 11.75 families served in a 2-hour span. Needless to say, the volunteers are hopping keeping up filling the orders.

On Wednesday, September 17, we had our monthly food run to Toledo to get more food.

For Thanksgiving, we will have the clients mark the items that want on an additional sheet marked for Thanksgiving. Food items requested are located in the weekly bulletin and the monthly Epistle. Thank you for your donations. I will need additional helpers the month of November to fill the orders.

Fred and I will travel to Keystone in Lima to pick up the canned turkey. If you would like to contribute to the cost of the canned turkey, mark your donation to the food pantry-TURKEY. The projected expense for 9 cases of turkey is \$1,458.00. THANK YOU!

The food pantry relies on volunteers to help check people in and to fill the orders. This January through April, I have several people who will be going south for the winter. I NEED HELP! Still others add a few "gifts" from the Old Testament, which many Christians prefer to call "talents."


